BRIAN BARLAAM: MITZVAH HERO

For more than two decades, Brian Barlaam has been doing something nice for people he barely knows.

Each week, he picks up the flowers that decorate the bimah for bar and bat mitzvahs and takes them to the Jewish Home up the road on Park Avenue.

And he does it, even though he is Roman Catholic and attends church weekly.

Brian is B'nai Israel's Mitzvah Hero this year, and he will be honored on Sunday, December 15, at the annual TzedakahFest from 3 to 6 p.m. at B'nai Israel. The event is sponsored by the Federation for Jewish Philanthropy.

It is an honor he accepted reluctantly. "There are a lot of people who do a lot more than I do." He added that when our president, Shari Nerreau, mentioned his efforts in her annual address on Rosh Hashanah, "I turned beet red."

Brian, a school psychologist, and his wife, Linda, have been members of B'nai Israel for about 23 years.

"I wanted to give back, so I joined the Caring Committee," he said. But as a Catholic, he felt limited in what he could do, noting, "I didn't

feel comfortable going to the hospital to pray with people."

Cantor Sheri Blum was always looking for someone to take the flowers to the Jewish Home. "So I said I'll just do the flowers," he recalled, and he hasn't stopped since.

"I come on Saturday afternoon, once the service is over, and take them directly to the Jewish Home. It takes about a half hour."

He said his wife has volunteered on many committees, heading the committee that sends gift items to college students.

The congregation's previous Mitvah Heros were Bob Sussman and Sherry Portnoy.

FROM THE RABBI'S DESK/RABBI EVAN SCHULTZ EIGHT NIGHTS, EIGHT DIFFERENT LIGHTS

It is December and the Hebrew month of Kislev, which means that Chanukah is in the air! Many of us love this holiday season, when we get to eat fried potatoes and jelly donuts, spin the dreidel, and of course light the *chanukiyah* menorah each night during the festival of Chanukah.

Lighting the menorah is one of the most commonly observed Jewish rituals among American Jews. The symbolism of the menorah is quite meaningful for many – the notion of adding more light to the world during the darkest time of year. The lights recall for many of us the victory of the few over the many, and the great miracles which we witnessed, not only during the period of the Maccabees but too in our everyday lives.

I want to offer just a few ideas of easy ways to deepen even further the ritual of lighting the Chanukah menorah. We have tried a few of these in our home and some I have been wanting to try - so maybe this is the year. If you have special ways you light the menorah during the festival of Chanukah, I'd also love to hear about them! You can always email me at eschultz@cbibpt.org.

Dedicate each light to someone - In Judaism it's always powerful to dedicate a ritual or sacred moment in honor of someone special who has died or who is living. Recently one of our long time Torah study regulars shared with us that he was moving to Florida. At his recent final Torah study session, we dedicated our study to him, and he was quite touched. As you light the candles each night you can dedicate the lighting to someone - as a way of recalling the memory of a loved one, or in honor of friends or guests visiting your home that night, or perhaps even dedicated to a historical figure that has had some kind of impact on you.

Donate each night to a different charity

This is one ritual I'd love to begin in our family. Choose a different charity that you'd like to donate to each night. I recently learned about this idea when Robert Bank, president of American Jewish World Service, sent out an email on Chanukah encouraging us to donate as part of our Chanukah celebration. "With each act of *tzedakah* — giving for justice — you illuminate the world as well. And just like the menorah, that light grows



stronger when our whole community joins together," he wrote.

For families with young kids: Choose a night to donate presents to kids in need

- We started doing this in our family a few years ago. Each child chooses one night to offer their present to a local charity. We take them to the toy store or Target and let them pick out a toy that we'll then donate. It has always been a meaningful activity for our family and a nice way for the kids to recognize that there are families and children in need right here in our community.

Hope these ideas help to elevate your Chanukah celebration! Happy Chanukah!

There is perhaps nothing better on a cold winter day than a fireplace, a good book, and a cup of coffee nearby. And in my family, when it comes to Chanukah presents, books are always a reliable goto. And so in honor of Chanukah and the cold days ahead - days that will, hopefully, provide some time for respite and relaxation — below are a few of my favorite reads, all with a Jewish twist, with the hope that these titles will provide some insight or inspiration to you, or to someone else, in the coming months:

The Immoralists

By Chloe Benjamin

Everything changes when four teenage siblings, on a lark, ask a fortuneteller to reveal the dates of their deaths. From then on, one piece of possibly spurious information conspires with character and circumstance to warp the siblings' choices as they grow into adulthood. Along the way are intriguing questions about the value of longevity and whether we are victims, or perpetrators, of our own fates.

A Guide for the Perplexed By Dara Horn

Software prodigy Josie Ashkenazi has invented an application that records everything its users do. When an Egyptian library invites her to visit as a consultant, her jealous sister Judith persuades her to go. But in Egypt's post revolutionary chaos, Josie is abducted — leaving Judith free to take over Josie's life at home, including her husband and daughter, while Josie's talent for preserving memories becomes a surprising test of her empathy and her only means of escape. A century earlier, another traveler arrives in Egypt: Solomon Schechter, a Cambridge professor hunting for a medieval archive hidden in a Cairo synagogue. Both he and Josie are haunted by the work of the medieval philosopher Moses Maimonides, a doctor and rationalist who sought to reconcile faith and science, destiny and free will. But what Schechter finds, as he tracks down the remnants of a thousand-year-old community's once-vibrant life, will reveal the power and perils of what Josie's ingenious work brings into being: a world where nothing is ever forgotten. An engrossing adventure that intertwines stories from Genesis, medieval philosophy, and the digital frontier.

BONIM BUZZ/ALEXA COHEN, EARLY CHILDHOOD DIRECTOR STREAM IN BONIM

The children at Bonim have been so busy in our STREAM Lab. Each class enjoys a weekly visit to the Lab with Mrs. Adele Josovitz for some fun and learning.

Recently we talked about sunflowers, seed distribution, pollination, pinecones, the formation of different types of clouds and the changing color of leaves.

CLOUDS

Often as we look into the sky, clouds drift by in many shapes, sizes and shades of gray, pink and purple. By asking open-ended questions the students used multiple modalities to help them learn about and answer questions about clouds.

Some of the open-ended questions the students were presented included:

How are clouds formed? What are clouds made of? Why do clouds seem to float? How do clouds move in the sky?

Students had the opportunity to learn about clouds through the following modalities:

SCIENCE:

The students did two types of science experiments that showed how clouds were formed why rain came from clouds.

TECHNOLOGY:

The students used various techniques and materials for an art project about clouds.

READING:

Each student received the book <u>Clouds</u> by Kira Freed to share with their families at home.

ENGINEERING:

Students used materials in the STREAM room to build and create.

<u>ART:</u>

The students created four types of clouds, using various techniques and materials.

MATH:

The students sequentially recreated the Water Cycle using the motion of their hands, arms and bodies.

Each topic was presented using multiple modalities which provided diverse experiences. This helped improve student engagement and enabled the children to learn by using different skills.

The expectation is to give students exposure to different areas of science using STREAM as the basis for their learning.

While the students may not always remember the specific names and definitions used in the lessons, this may be the first step in learning about specific scientific areas.



FROM THE EDUCATION CENTER/IRA J. WISE LEARNING TO STAND UP FOR OURSELVES

A snapshot from last year: A Kitah Daled (4th grade) student came up to me and one of our teachers, Susan Walden, while waiting outside to be picked up after class. She told us that in school the other day, she and her friends were talking about their favorite foods and she had said hers was matzah ball soup. One of the other kids asked, "Are you Jewish?" She answered that she was. "Then I can't be friends with you anymore. Jews are bad people," came the reply.

Our student then told us: "I told him that he was wrong. That you cannot decide someone is bad because of their religion or where their family came from. I also told him he was being rude and mean.

A fourth grader's response to Anti-Semitism: "I told him that he was wrong."

Then I told my teacher and my principal. Thank you for helping me know how to do that!"

The Sunday before she told us that story, she and her parents had joined the rest of the Kitah Daled families in a workshop called Julia's Star run by the Anti-Defamation League (ADL). She and her parents will take part in additional workshops in Kitah Vav (6th) and Kitah Chet (8th). This year, all three programs took place in the last month.

I am proud to say that we did not begin having these programs in response to any one particular traumatic event. Three years ago, Susan came to me suggesting we offer an ADL program to Kitah Chet. She had just signed on as a facilitator of these programs. She was so impressed by what ADL offers, she felt it vital we bring them in. The response of parents and students was overwhelming. The most repeated critique was "I wish I had something like this when I was younger." And now we offer a three-tiered program, revisiting some issues and deepening understanding of others. Most importantly, our students and their parents are learning skills to help them face down prejudice and anti-Semitism in real time.

Susan is now the coordinator of these programs for the ADL in Connecticut, in addition to continuing to teach Kitah Hey and serving as a Vice President of B'nai Israel. She has recruited several of our teens who are paired with adult facilitators to run these workshops. Four of our own took part in leading Julia's star this year.

I am grateful that we are able to fund this program and that the Federation for Jewish Philanthropy allocates funds to help us fit it into our budget. These are critical skills for our students. L'shalom, Ira J. Wise, D.J.R.E. Director of Education


