HALF CENTURY+ TEMPLE MEMBERS WILL BE HONORED JUNE 24, 2022

Flash back to 1972. President Richard Nixon visited China. The cell phone, the floppy disc, and the video cassette recorder were all introduced. And the Dow Jones Industrial Average closed above 1,000 for the first time in history!

Meanwhile, at Congregation B'nai Israel, more than 60 families who were members then and who continue as members today, were quietly attending services, celebrating Jewish holidays, sending their kids to religious school and enjoying Bar and Bat Mitzvah and confirmation ceremony moments with family and friends.

In recognition of their ongoing support and participation in Jewish life and temple community activities over the last half century, or longer in some cases, these families will all be recognized at Shabbat Services on Friday evening, June 24 at 6:00 p.m. Depending on weather and other circumstances, the event may take place outside in B'nai Israel's Outdoor Prayer and Community Space. More details will be announced when plans are final.

"It is really a celebration for all B'nai Israel members, regardless of when you joined the temple," said Shari Nerreau, a Board of Trustees member, and the immediate past president of the congregation. "It is just that at this milestone moment we felt we wanted to call a little special attention to those members who have been a regular part of our community for five decades or longer," she added.

Actually, the idea was brought to Shari's attention by member Nancy Rosenthal almost three years ago, but the social

distancing requirements and other restrictions during the initial phase of the Covid-19 pandemic hindered event planning.

"We're having a Covid catchup moment," said Nancy Rosenthal, who added that she felt committed members of long duration at B'nai Israel should be recognized periodically in the same way that retiring temple officers and other congregation leaders are honored.

Mitzvah Morning

For our June Mitzvah Morning Project, we will be working with Camp HOPE America, a program managed by The Center For Family Justice (www. centerforfamilyjustice.org).

Camp HOPE America is a summer camp specifically for children from Fairfield County who are victims of domestic abuse. The camp provides a clinically proven program designed to help these children overcome trauma in order to lead more hopeful and resilient lives. For two weeks during August, Camp HOPE America campers will spend time at Camp Hi-Rock in the Berkshires enjoying activities in the outdoors, while receiving critical counseling and therapeutic services.

On June 12, we will meet at B'nai Israel to help pack trunks for the campers. Many of the campers are lacking the essential items they will need for their time away, so we are looking for B'nai Israel volunteers



to help provide them. Some supplies we are looking for include backpacks, batteries, flashlights, fleece blankets, water bottles, laundry bags, and pillowcases.

Volunteers can bring these items to Mitzvah Morning or are welcome to drop them off in the B'nai Israel lobby the week before the event. In addition, there is an Amazon wishlist which will be published in our email communications. Any items purchased on the Amazon wishlist will be delivered directly to B'nai Israel. Gently used items are welcome as well.

FROM THE RABBI'S DESK/RABBI EVAN SCHULTZ

OFFERING SUPPORT AROUND DEATH, LOSS, AND GRIEF

In Jewish tradition, some of the most powerful mitzvot, or commandments, that we can do surround the loss of a loved one and the process of grief. When friends, colleagues, and fellow congregants lose someone dear to them, one of the most important things we can do is show up for them in their moment of sorrow. It is that moment often when their world turns upside-down, and when we as a community can be there at their side

There are so many ways to be there for one another, from showing up to a shiva service, to sending a condolence note in the mail, to sending food to their home. Those little gestures make such a difference to those who are mourning and grieving. This June, we want to offer several new opportunities for our congregants to fulfill these mitzvot around death and dying.

On June 21 at 7:00 p.m., I invite you to join with our clergy for a training on leading a shiva minyan. Oftentimes our clergy will lead shiva minyans at our congregants' homes, and at the same time

B'nai Israel has always had a tradition of lay people leading shiva minyans as well. It is a powerful experience to show up for a fellow congregant in this way and lead a shiva minyan in their home during their time of grief. We will give you all the tools you need to lead a shiva service. It is one of the most poignant and powerful mitzvot that you can do. We would love for you to consider joining us on June 21. All experience levels are invited to join.

One of our congregants, Nina Silberman, recently experienced the power of a communal "shmira" group upon the passing of her father. Shmira, which means to "watch over," is a group of volunteers from a synagogue or Jewish community that assumes the role of "watching the body" before the funeral and burial. Nina was so moved by the experience of her parents' synagogue in Westchester that we have been speaking about the idea of starting a shmira group at B'nai Israel.

What shmira would entail is volunteers signing up for a one-hour shift, from 5:00 p.m. to midnight at Abraham Green and

Son Funeral Home in Fairfield upon the death of one of our congregants. There is a room where volunteers sit (separated from the deceased body) and oftentimes read the Psalms or spiritual passages, as a way of "watching over" the body. It is a way of showing great care and respect for the person who has just passed away.

At this information session, we will share more about what's involved and answer any questions that potential volunteers might have. We hope that we can make a shmira group a reality here at B'nai Israel and perform this mitzvah as a way of honoring those who have passed away in our community. We hope that you'll join us to learn more.

B'nai Israel is such an incredible and caring community. We hope that you will join us for shiva leader training and to learn more about shmira. And most important, let's always show up and be present to one another and uplift each other in our most joyous moments, and in our times of loss, grief, and sorrow.

Progress Not Perfection by Anne Kirsch

For those who don't know me, I teach in the Bonim Preschool and am very active in the temple. My environmental gurus are my daughter (whose life's work is devoted to the environment), my brother (who will go down any refusereduce-reuse-recycle rabbit hole with me) and Brad Kerner, congregant and parent of former Bonim students. I like to focus on what many of us talk about in the B'nai Israel Green Team, "progress not perfection," which I embrace wholeheartedly. At home, like many of us, I use cloth napkins/paper towels, stasher bags, cloth snack bags, beeswax wraps instead of plastic wrap, all kinds



of reusable containers, green cleaning projects, and try to cut down on single-serving items. I still have some paper towels/napkins and less green alternatives in the house, but I use (or rinse, reuse, repeat) them infrequently. Progress not perfection. Keeping as much out of the

landfill as possible is always on my mind (a definite challenge when dealing with both my mother's and mother-in-law's estates recently). We compost in the backyard. I don't do so much with the compost — just keep it out of the landfill. Progress not perfection. We have a shiny Toyota RAV4 Hybrid in our driveway as of a year ago, and our next car will be electric. Efficient use of water/heat/AC/ electricity/gas/oil is always a goal in our house but some days, we do better than others. Progress not perfection. With the aid of our congregation's Green Team, my fellow teachers and parents, I hope to move Bonim on to "greener" pastures. Join me on the progress not perfection bandwagon.



FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY/RABBI SARAH R. MARION PASSOVER YIZKOR REFLECTIONS

I want to offer my sincere gratitude and appreciation for the outpouring of love and care that I received from the B'nai Israel community in the days following the death of my beloved Grandma Gertrude. Your sentiments and messages were deeply comforting and tremendously touching. Finding myself in my own experience of mourning this past Passover season, I offered these Yizkor reflections at our 7th Day Passover service:

If we knew that they were listening, what would we want to tell them? If we knew that they could hear us, what would we want say?

I miss you.

I wish we had more time.

I never wanted to believe that someday, you'd be gone.

There's a hole, in my heart.

I almost set a place for you, at the Passover table.

I made your favorite recipes this year...I tried, but they didn't quite turn out the same.

I wore your favorite earnings to the Seder – remember the ones with the black pearls at the end that you wore to your birthday party?

I went to the beach and watched the sunset, just like we once did together, and it almost felt like you were there.

At the grocery store yesterday, I was walking down the aisle, and for a moment, I could have sworn I saw you, right there, in the distance.

The house feels so quiet, and so empty, now that you're gone.

Life without you feels so disorienting... there are days when I'm not sure what I should be doing with myself...or what I'm even supposed to be thinking, or feeling...

How are we supposed to go on, without you?

You would be so proud of the kids -

perfect reading scores on their report cards, getting so big, so fast.

I need you.

I miss you.

I love you.

I have a voicemail from my Grandma, saved on my phone, from November 15, 2015. Still saved after all these years, and of course, how could I possibly delete it now: "Hi sweetie, it's Grandma...I love you so much..." Just a simple, ordinary message — nothing particularly earth shattering, or revealing — just a simple, ordinary remnant, of who she was. And what she was. And how much she loved. And, now, a reminder, that there will never ever again, be another voicemail.

That's the thing about death, isn't it. The devastating finality of it all. "They live on through our memories," we say. And, yet, at the same time, no more phone calls. No more voicemails. No more "I just called to say I love you" messages. No more hugs.

No more birthday cards. No more visits. No more opportunities to sit and talk and laugh...all of it, now undeniably, in the past.

There is a tradition at Jewish funerals that happens at graveside. After the prayers, after the Mourner's Kaddish, after the burial and after the heavy clunk of the soil hitting the casket, the very last thing we do, before leaving the cemetery, is to form two parallel lines – two parallel rows of people – creating something that looks like a "parting of the sea" for the immediate family of the deceased to walk through, as they make their way out of the cemetery. Because leaving the graveside, leaving the cemetery, leaving the past behind, and walking towards a future without a mother, a father, a sister, a grandmother...this is something that is unbelievably daunting. And unfamiliar.

And painful. And this is something that we cannot do, alone.

Today is the 7th day of Passover. Today is the day, according to legend, that the Red Sea parted, and the Israelites officially stepped forward, towards next phase of their lives.

Oftentimes, we envision their trek into and out of the sea as a moment of festivity and joy - forgetting, that the Israelites had absolutely no idea what the road ahead would look like, be like, or feel like. Stepping into those divided waters, towards the unchartered territory that awaited them, this must have been unbelievably daunting. And disorienting. And, maybe, even, a little bit painful. Because even though it was arduous, Egypt, at least, was known, and predictable, and recognizable – but now, this hazy, vague, strange and unfamiliar road ahead -what was it going to be like? And so, I'll bet they stepped forward, but slowly...and I'll bet they stepped forward, but with hesitation, consternation, and maybe a bit of fear - because saying goodbye to the past and turning and facing the unknown regardless of time or place...this is never an easy thing, to do.

But midrash tells us, that when the waters parted, something else remarkable happened, which made it a little bit easier for the Israelites to face the future and take one step forward – and then another – and then another. Midrash tells us that when the waters parted, the waters rose straight up, turning into two straight walls on either side. And after the water-walls rose up on either side, the inside part of those walls turned into giant, shining mirrors that reflected the faces of the Israelites as they passed through. But that's not all. Not only did those mirrors reflect the faces of every

Women of the Tanach Fridays, June 3, 10, and 17 from noon – 1:30 p.m.



While there are hundreds of female figures in the Tanach, only a small handful are well known. In this class, we will expand our understanding of

biblical women, both in terms of breadth and depth. We will read the stories of several specific characters in order to see more broadly how women are portrayed in our most sacred text. Some fit gender stereotypes, others defy them; some are defined by their piety, others by their villainous deeds. Join Rabbinic Intern Chelsea Feuchs as she lays out her theory of the roles women play in the Tanach, developed through several years of research and teaching.




