Introducing ShulCloud. What is ShulCloud? It is a web cloud-based synagogue management software system that offers billing features along with detailed membership management. Everyone in the community has their own online member portal to pay bills and update their records. Why the switch? Our previous system, MM2000, was not cloud-based, was antiquated (note the name) and it no longer allowed us to manage congregant information in the way we needed. ### FROM THE RABBI'S DESK/RABBI EVAN SCHULTZ

### BRINGING THE MACHZOR TO LIFE

The High Holy Day machzor. What do all of those books do throughout the year when they're not being used? For the most part they sit quietly in cabinets behind the bimah, silent, static, "frozen," awaiting their big moment in the fall, when they are opened up, their prayers beautifully sung, and their words read aloud by congregants looking to start anew in the coming year.

The prayers and the words in the High Holy Day machzor are so incredible, so majestic. Prayers of yearning, asking forgiveness, and deep self-reflection. Within those prayerbooks are melodies that our people have sung for hundreds of years, from Bridgeport to the great synagogues of Europe, to the tiny little shtiebels along the ancient streets of Jerusalem.

And most powerfully, these prayerbooks truly have the power to transform when we take them off the shelves each year for the High Holy Days. Hopefully, they give our lives added meaning, just as we, when we open them up, give meaning to the word and prayers printed on their pages.

As author Iain McGilchrist writes about the power of books (which I think applies to the machzor as well), "Books cannot have meaning without life... life goes into books and books go back into life... what is in them not only adds to life, but genuinely goes back into life and transforms it. On the shelf, the contents of the book are dead: they come back to life only in the process of being read. No longer static, boundaried, 'frozen', the contents of the book are taken up into the world." (The Master and His Emmisary, p 196)

In just a few weeks we'll hold these very books in our hands, and by turning the pages, in a sense, give life to these books that have sat quietly in the cabinets for almost a year. McGilchrist's words invite us to see our interaction with these books as a two-way relationship. There's so much that we glean from the poetry, the writings,

the calls of the shofar, that stirs our very souls each and every year.

And at the same time, when we read and sing these prayers, we are bringing the contents of these books to life. We bring the *t'kiyah*, *truah*, and *shvarim* to life. We bring to life the words of the *al cheyt* and *kol nidrei*, the *unetaneh tokef* and *Avinu Malkeinu*. Without us, those words become simply frozen, static, and boundaried. We're the ones to bring them to life, just as they in return bring us to life and transform us over Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.

In just a few weeks on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, as we hold these prayerbooks in our hands, may we realize the incredible opportunity and responsibility of the moment. May we be transformed by the words and poems upon the page, and may we transform those words and prayers from static and frozen to alive!

# "TURNING YOUR SHOES AROUND:" A STORY FOR THE MONTH OF ELUL

Once again, we have reached the Hebrew month of Elul, the month leading up to our High Holy Days. The month of Elul is the official start of our journey towards introspection and significant personal reflection in order to start the year anew. Each year, over the course of the High Holiday season, we aim for t'shvuah. In Hebrew, t'shuvah means "turning" or "returning." From the start of Elul, right up until the final shofar blast at the conclusion of Yom Kippur, this is a time of turning: turning back, to our best and our truest selves, turning back, towards the people and the places that are in need of us the most.

I love the way that the famous folktale "Turning Your Shoes Around" imaginatively illustrates the kind of "turning" that we all might want to strive for throughout these upcoming High Holy Days, and beyond:

Once upon a time, there was a man who had grown very unhappy with his life. He found no joy in his work, no joy in his community, and no joy in his family. And he cried out, "Dear God, please take me to Paradise! I'm ready to go on into the next life and leave this life behind."

And God said to him, "Are you sure you're really ready?" And the man said, "I am so unhappy in this life. There is no joy, there is nothing here for me. I'm ready to go to Paradise, where there will be great joy."

And God said, "OK. But you should know, once you go to Paradise, there is no going home again." The man said, "Yes, yes, that's fine, that's what I want!" God said, "Well, you're in luck! Because Paradise is only about a two-day journey from here!"

Upon hearing this, the man's heart swelled. He was so excited! He packed up a few things for the journey, got up the next morning, and left everything behind. And he set off for Paradise.

After walking for a while, he decided that it was time to lay down to sleep, and so he found a tree on the side of the road. He went to lie down, and before he fell asleep, he took off his shoes, and pointed them in the direction of the road to Paradise. He didn't want to forget where he was going when he woke up in the morning!

But overnight, while he was sleeping, something funny happened.

Perhaps it was some mischievous passers-by, or maybe some creatures from the forest came and started playing, or perhaps, it was an angel. But, one way or another, during the night, while he was sleeping, the man's shoes got turned around.

The man woke up in the morning, rested from a beautiful sleep, and he slipped his feet into his shoes that were pointing towards Paradise, just as he had left them...or so he thought...because, little did he know, that his shoes were now actually pointing back towards home.

And from there, after putting his shoes back on, the man set off, continuing his journey to Paradise.

He walked for another full day, and just as darkness began to descend, he reached the top of a hill, looked down into a valley, and saw a gleaming village — and his heart leapt. He couldn't believe it — he had finally made it to Paradise! He ran down the hill, ran into the center of the village, and it was the most beautiful thing he had ever seen. It was so clean and bright. He sat down in the town square, and watched the townspeople finishing their workday, smiling and full of joy and laughter. He remembered the village where he came from, and how the people were always so unhappy, so tired

at the end of the day. He looked down at Paradise and saw children finishing school, playing in the streets, beginning to head home for dinner, and he reveled in their joy. The children in his village were always just loud and noisy!

From that day on, every day for the man was a joy. Every day of Paradise was like waking up anew. Every day, he gave back to his community, and every day, he found meaning and delight in his beautiful town. Every day, he continued on this way, up until his very last.

And there was not a single person who could ever convince him that he was not truly living in Paradise.

From Elul to Yom Kippur – this is a time of turning. During this time, we "turn our shoes around," back towards ourselves, so that we might travel inwards, taking a deep and close look at who we are, and who we want to be. During this time, our shoes point the way.

Throughout this High Holiday season, as we turn our shoes and as we turn ourselves, may we see ourselves and may we see our lives in a completely new way. Though journeying inwards might cause us to see flaws we wish to change and errors we might wish to amend, perhaps our inward journeys might also offer glimpses of our own personal "Paradise." As we turn into ourselves, may we find strength and resilience that we never saw before. Maybe we will see love and gratitude that we never saw before. Maybe we will see the chance for a new beginning or a new mindset that we didn't think was possible before. And, maybe, just maybe, by that final shofar blast on Yom Kippur, we might feel that we are a little closer to "Paradise" than we ever were before.

It all starts with our shoes.

### FREE MEDICARE ADVICE AVAILABLE

For those of you who are unaware, I am a Choices Volunteer Counselor. I provide free Medicare advice to seniors and their caregivers. I served as a Medicare Part D counselor in NY from 2004 till 2011, when I moved to Fairfield. In CT I have been affiliated with the Southwest Connecticut Agency for the Aging since 2012. I am certified by Connecticut and SHIP (State Health Insurance Plans) as an **unpaid volunteer** to do this work.

Everyone on Medicare is required to have a drug plan that is considered a credible Part D plan.

Everyone's plan should be reviewed annually, as premiums and drugs included in the program constantly change. Insurance companies negotiate individually with each pharmaceutical company for each drug they cover. Surprises are the rule, not the exception.

There is an open enrollment period from October 15 to December 7 that permits you to change your plan and possibly save a significant amount of money.

There are also other options that are available during this enrollment period. They have to do with Part C Advantage Plans and Traditional Medicare. If you have any concerns regarding any Medicare situation, please feel free to connect with me.






