FROM THE RABBI'S DESK/RABBI EVAN SCHULTZ BET MITZVAH – AN INCLUSIVE TERM FOR THE JEWISH COMING OF AGE CEREMONY

(Adapted from an article I co-authored with Rabbi Linda Joseph for the CCAR)

In recent years, existing terms for the Jewish coming-of-age ceremony — commonly referred to as a bar or bat mitzvah in singular, b'nai or b'not mitzvah in plural — have come to seem inadequate due to their gendered nature. Here at B'nai Israel, we have always referred to the ceremony as a "b'nai mitzvah."

This past spring, our Religious Practices Committee set out to craft a general term for our congregation to use that is more inclusive of all gender expressions and identities. We spent some time establishing criteria, researching, asking questions, and discussing.

In our conversation, three key priorities were identified: We wanted a term to be inclusive of all gender identities and gender expressions. We wanted a term that honored the Hebrew language in its usage and meaning. And we wanted a term that used familiar or existing language so that it would be understandable, usable, and "sticky" (i.e., people would be inclined to use it). Ultimately, we settled on the term "bet mitzvah." We found this nomenclature compelling for several reasons:

- Bet is the first Hebrew letter of the traditional name of this lifecycle event, so the term is gender neutral. Using the letter bet provides flexibility for a student to choose which term they would like to use: bar mitzvah, bat mitzvah, b'nai mitzvah, or bet mitzvah. It thus acknowledges the traditional terms while creating a new term that honors diverse gender inclusivity and expression. Bet mitzvah is also the term recommended by the Nonbinary Hebrew Project and is already in use in several congregations.
- The letter bet is the first letter of the Torah. It is the letter opening the parashah that honors all of God's creations. It is a letter open to possibilities for what may follow. In addition, bet can be read as the conjunctive form of bayit, alluding to the inclusion of all participants who have a "home" in Judaism in this coming-of-age ceremony. In Hebrew, bet mitzvah makes sense as a conjunctive.

• Finally, bet is a term that both Hebrew literate and non-Hebrew literate members of our communities have heard before. Like the more traditional familiar terms, it is one syllable. The committee believed this term could become "sticky."

The RPC felt that bet mitzvah best reflected our determinants of inclusivity, honoring Hebrew, and using familiar or existing language. Importantly, we do not intend for this term to replace "bar mitzvah" and "bat mitzvah" but rather to be an additional, inclusive option for families and youths. While "bet mitzvah" will be our general default term at the synagogue, we hope that each student will be encouraged to choose the term that's most meaningful to them.

I want to thank the members of the RPC for such a thoughtful discussion, and our entire synagogue for our striving to always be a Jewish space that is inclusive and where all feel that they are seen, loved, and belong.

INTRODUCING THE GEORGE MARKLEY CHESED FUND

We are very excited to announce the establishment of a new special purpose fund to honor George Markley called "The George Markley Chesed Fund." George was a long-standing, beloved member of our community who loved Congregation B'nai Israel, embodied the values of our congregation, and gave generously of his time and self to our synagogue and the broader Bridgeport community. So many of us hold and cherish our favorite "George stories": our favorite anecdotes about how much he gave and how much he loved. There are truly not enough words to describe the extent of his abundant, overflowing kindness to others.

The new George Markley Chesed Fund will be used specifically for acts of chesed (loving kindness) within our community. Our Chesed Committee will have access to these funds to cook or purchase meals for those who are ill, grieving, or going through a difficult time as well as for families who are welcoming a new baby. The committee also purchases mini Shabbat challahs and wine that is brought to the homes of congregants who are homebound or returning from hospital stays.

B'NAI ISRAEL CAMPERS LEARN THE VALUE OF TZEDUKAH BY HELPING CAMP HOPE





Tzedakah is an important part of the Education Center Curriculum for both Bonim Preschool and Kehilah. Each week the students come to school proudly with some change (or dollars) to add to their classroom tzedakah box. For the 3-year-olds, it's in the form of a dinosaur. The children proudly feed the dinosaur with the goal of filling his tummy and helping people in need. This year, the Education Center at Congregation B'nai Israel has chosen Camp HOPE to be the recipient of their tzedakah collection.

We learned about Camp HOPE through B'nai Israel's involvement with our neighbors down Park Avenue, the Center for Family Justice (CFJ): "Since its inception, CFJ has been proud to bring this program to a growing number of children and teens and has offered more than 200 camperships. Program participants include young people ages 7-17 from the communities of Bridgeport, Easton, Fairfield, Monroe, Stratford and Trumbull... Camp HOPE offers children and teens who have been the primary or secondary survivors of trauma the chance to reclaim part of the childhoods they lost through a fun and transformative program focused on helping them foster newfound hope and resiliency in their lives."

Camp HOPE campers engage in a week of summer camp on the grounds of Camp Hi-Rock, an accredited overnight camp operated by CFJ's partner, the Central Connecticut Coast YMCA. Beginning in 2019, the campers also engage in a yearlong Pathways to HOPE program which includes social activities, mentorship and opportunities to engage in community and special events. During the summer program, campers engage in an evidencebased curriculum while enjoying a week of traditional overnight summer camp experiences such as swimming, campfires, hiking, sailing, and navigating high-ropes courses.




Camp is something very familiar to the students at Congregation B'nai Israel. Whether it's Bonim in the Sun for our youngest learners or sleepaway camps like Crane Lake or Eisner for the Kehilahaged kids, summer camp means fun!!! And for their parents, it's lots and lots of packing of backpacks, duffel bags, and trunks. When we heard that Camp HOPE campers needed donations to make sure their campers had everything necessary for a successful camp experience, we knew just what to do. We collected over \$500 in tzedakah donations from all those coins and dollars throughout the year and started shopping from Camp HOPE'S wish list.

On June 12th, Sasha and Alexis from Camp HOPE visited Congregation B'nai Israel to collect our donations and talk to the kids a bit about their story. Congregation B'nai Israel's campers proudly marched into the pavilion, arms filled with water bottles, sleeping bags, towels, blankets, bug spray, and duffel bags to give to the kids of Camp HOPE. They played games with Sasha and Alexis and listened to a book about a boy who was scared to go to camp and how his friends helped him get over his anxiety. We talked about why those items were important for kids to go to camp. Three-year-old Henry told Sasha that water bottles were important "to stay hydrated." Four-year-old Divahlee told everyone that "the kids need towels so they can go swimming."



It's going to be a great summer for the campers of Camp Hope and Congregation B'nai Israel!







IT'S TIME TO UPDATE YOUR SHULCLOUD SETTINGS

Happy anniversary, ShulCloud!

The first year of Congregation B'nai Israel's new membership management software system proved very successful. Now, it is time to make it more successful for you by updating your payment settings.

The online portal enables Congregation B'nai Israel congregants to more easily view their balances, pay annual contributions and other fees, set up automatic recurring payments, make donations, view family yahrzeits, and view the congregation directory.

Heading into the 2023-24 budget year, your ShulCloud username and password remain the same, but you must log in to create a new schedule for your automatic payments. You can choose the same schedule you used last year, but you must indicate that in the system for this year's payments to take effect.

ShulCloud lets you set up a payment schedule that is right for you — a one-time full payment, monthly payments, payments every other month, and so on. Please remember that you must pay at least 25 percent of your annual contribution up front to be eligible for High Holy Days services tickets.

ShulCloud's scheduling convenience extends beyond your annual contribution. You can combine payments (security fee, Kehillah, Bonim, etc.) into the same payment schedule. Please note that while most annual payments can be spread monthly into June, Bonim payments must be completed by May.

While ShulCloud makes it easier for you, you can help to make the process easier for B'nai Israel:

- The sooner you make your payments throughout the year, the quicker B'nai Israel can address much-needed projects and improvements. Plus, it makes planning easier for the next budget year.
- You can choose to pay via ACH (Automated Clearing House) directly from your bank account, as opposed to paying by credit card. B'nai Israel incurs a processing fee for every credit-card payment, so an electronic ACH transfer saves the synagogue money, as ACH payments do not incur any additional fees.
- If you do pay by credit card, you can choose to cover the processing fees when you set up your payment schedule.

The instructions for setting up each form of payment can be found on ShulCloud, which you can access via the Member Login section at www.cbibpt.org. Of course, you can always call B'nai Israel's helpful office staff for assistance at (203) 336-1858.

DIFFERENCES IN MENTAL HEALTH WORKERS

Greetings from Congregation B'nai Israel's Mental Health Committee. We hope everyone is enjoying their summer. This month we would like to focus on mental health practitioners and the different services they offer. As a practicing registered nurse, I often hear confusion as to what the differences are between the services offered by a psychiatrist, psychologist, nurse practitioner, social worker, and mental health counselor. Hopefully, this will serve to clear up any confusion.

A licensed psychiatrist is either a M.D. (medical doctor) or D.O. (doctor of osteopathic medicine) and can prescribe medication as well as provide therapy. Both have attended medical school and have done a residency specializing in psychiatry. Many, if not most, psychiatrists confine their practice to prescribing medications with follow up visits to monitor the success of the medication. They diagnose illness and manage treatment.

A licensed nurse practitioner or advanced practice registered nurse (APRN) has attended an advanced program specializing in psychiatry, usually on a masters or doctorate level. They can also prescribethe right help you need. I suggest you lookmedication and provide therapy.for someone you have confidence in who can

A licensed psychologist also has an advanced degree and provides therapy but cannot prescribe medication. They have a doctorate degree (PhD) but are not medical doctors.

A licensed social worker (LCSW) or (MSW) must earn a master's degree in social work. Both are trained to perform psychotherapy with a particular emphasis on connecting people with the community and support services that are available. They do not prescribe medication.

A mental health counselor requires a master's degree in mental health counseling in order to become licensed. They can be marriage and family therapists (LMFT) or counselors who have degrees such as LPC/LMHC/ NCC. They do not prescribe medication.

The services provided by the practitioners mentioned above often overlap, but only licensed psychiatrists and APRNs can prescribe medication. No matter who you decide to choose, it is most important to look for certain qualities in the practitioner so that you feel comfortable and are getting the right help you need. I suggest you look for someone you have confidence in who can communicate well, has patience, is observant and respectful, has good listening skills, and that you feel you can trust.

Visit the websites of the following organization to locate practitioners of mental health: American Psychological Association and the National Register, American Association of Marriage and Family Therapists, Association of LGBTQ+ Psychiatrists, or naswct.org (to access social workers). Another way to find a therapist is to ask your physician to suggest someone they trust or to ask your friends. You should also consult your insurance directory to see if you are covered.

Each month the mental health committee hopes to provide educational information and resources to get effective help to those experiencing a mental health condition or who know someone else experiencing a problem. We encourage and welcome everyone to join our committee. We meet once a month on Zoom in the evening. Please contact the synagogue office if you would like further information.
