Rosh Hashanah begins sunset Wednesday, October 2

Yom Kippur begins sunset Friday, October 11

Dear Friends.

We hope you are having a wonderful summer! It's hard to believe, but we have already begun preparations for the High Holy Days this year and are excited to welcome everyone for our incredible services, music, and programs.

As we have looked at logistics and planning, security has been front of mind, especially after the 10/7 attacks in Israel. We have made a few changes to enhance our security procedures and keep everyone in our community as safe as possible. The changes are highlighted below:

Security and Entrance

For the protection of all our congregants, there will be only one access point to enter the building during the Holidays. Everyone will be directed to enter services through the main entrance of the synagogue. Ushers will check tickets before you enter the building.

In addition to the one access point to enter the building, this year we will have Bridgeport Police on hand at all services and increased guard patrol both at the front of the building and near the tent.

For several years, congregants have expressed their concern about the security vulnerability of the tent service being so close to Park Avenue. This year we have made the decision to move the tent to the Rabbi James Prosnit Outdoor Community and Prayer Space and grassy area behind the Chapel. This area will be more secure and protected for our congregants. Continued on page 9




FROM THE RABBI'S DESK/RABBI EVAN SCHULTZ HIGH HOLY DAY READING LIST


The Amen Effect by Rabbi Sharon Brous Rabbi Brous is the founder and rabbi of IKAR in Los Angeles. She recently published a book based on a beautiful midrash from our rabbis

about showing up and offering love to those in pain or in need. The book is spiritually nourishing, easy to read, and a call to all of us to show up for one another in our most challenging and difficult moments. The lessons from this book moved me deeply and certainly will prepare our hearts and spirits for the High Holy Days.



Enter these Gates: Meditations for the Days of Awe by Alden Solovy This book was just published. Here is the description from the publisher:

American Jewry, especially around the issue of Reproductive Justice. In this book, she grounds her understanding of repentance in the teachings of Rabbi Moses Maimonides. If you are looking to spiritually prepare for the High Holy Days, I highly recommend this read.



Who by Fire: Leonard Cohen in the Sinai by Matti Friedman If you're a fan of Leonard Cohen or interested in Israeli history (or both), you'll love this book about Leonard Cohen

He reveals the path from terror to acceptance, confusion to clarity, doubt to belief, and from complacency to awe.

Just in case you hadn't heard, the High Holy Days come "late" this year. Yes, that means that the 1st of *Tishrei*, the first day of *Rosh Hashanah* does not fall until October 2. Although we may see these High Holy Days as being late on the calendar, they come right on time.

It has been a steamy summer here at the Education Center and we are all looking forward to a fall filled with crisp, fresh air and fun for all the kids of Bonim and Kehilah.

By the time you read this article, Bonim will be in full swing. After a week of maintenance shutdown where the floors were waxed and the classrooms were scrubbed, the teachers participated in a week of staff development workshops to feed their minds and spirits (also their tummies as many lunches and breakfasts were provided). Earlier in the summer, through the generosity of a grant, the hallways, stairwells, and two classrooms were painted. On August 26, a fresh, clean Education Center opened for the first day of Bonim Preschool. In order to keep up with increasing demands of Infant Toddler Care, we decided to run two Infant Rooms for the 2024-2025 school year. One will be for our youngest members (3 months to 10 months old) and the other will be geared to older infants (10 months to 16 months old). We are very excited to be able to be flexible with our classroom usage to meet the needs of our community. After all, our Infant Room is typically filled with siblings of current students and doesn't leave a lot of spaces open to new families. Stop by to check out our new classroom arrangements.

On September 8, Kehilah will kick off the 2024-2025 school year with our first day, followed by an all school family picnic. The Kehilah staff and B'nai Israel Choir joined together in late August for a combined dinner and short presentation by Peter Montagna on security at B'nai Israel. After the presentation, the choir began rehearsing for the High Holidays, and the Kehilah staff participated in our yearly staff orientation. We are thrilled to welcome new teachers in 2nd and 3rd grade as we say goodbye to Bonnie Alterman, who we thank for her many years of educating our Kehilah students. Thankfully, she is still willing to stay on as a substitute teacher. We are so grateful to her for her dedication and care. We worked this summer on the curriculum for all grades and continue to reimagine 7th grade, adding in field trips with the rabbis and leadership training with Bonnie Appel. Our hope is that after students have their Bet Mitzvah, they begin to work in the younger grades as junior hadrahaniks as part of their Sunday complement. Another fun new endeavor with the Kehilah students and families is "Shabbat"cuterie (like charcuterie with a Jewish flair), a special dinner for the upper grades in conjunction with grade level Kabbalat Shabbat services.

Looking forward to a great year in both schools!

HELP SPREAD DEMOCRACY: WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT VOTING IN CT

Congregation B'nai Israel Voting Team

Since 2018, the Voting Team has been advocating for 100% voter turnout among eligible voters from Congregation B'nai Israel. We continue to support statewide and national efforts to ensure that everyone eligible is registered and has access to voting.

Register to Vote

If you aren't already registered — maybe you've recently moved from out of state or another town or you will be turning 18 by Election Day — please do it! To check if you are registered and where you vote on November 5, go to myvote.ct.gov/lookup. To register to vote and change your address online by October 18, go to voterregistration.ct.gov. You'll need a valid CT driver's license or state ID. You can also register in person every day of early voting and on Election Day.

Vote in Person on Election Day, Tuesday, November 5

Polls are open from 6:00 a.m.-8:00 p.m.

Vote Early in Person

This year, you can vote early in person from October 21– 31 and November 1–3 from 10:00 a.m.–6:00 p.m.; and on October 29 and 31, 8:00 a.m.–8:00 p.m. Each city/town will have at least one polling place open for early voting search for Early Voting – CT.gov

Referendum on the November Ballot

In Connecticut, <u>no excuse absentee voting</u> requires a constitutional change. Currently, if you cannot make it to the polls in person, you must have a specific reason to receive an absentee ballot. As of this year, 36 states and the District of Columbia allow absentee voting without an excuse. In November, you will be able to vote on the question: *Shall the Constitution of the State be amended to permit the General Assembly to allow each voter to vote by absentee ballot?*

for the bulletin, but there is something that I don't have written down, and not because I don't need to be reminded of this

I need to prepare myself. Every day from Tisha B'Av until Selichot, I'll be thinking about who I am, and what I've done. Yes, I know that I told you I did that during the Counting of the Omer; from *Pesach* to *Shavuot*, but that was me looking inward. This is now about me looking out into the world around me. To the people and those of my community I've interacted with. To truly prepare, I need to do this now. For me to stand on the Bima Erev Rosh Hashanah and say, "Hineini" – "here I am", to pray and lead this congregation as a Shliach Tzibbur is not an entry on my Outlook calendar to be entered as a task. It is about who I am, a responsibility that I've never taken lightly, and to be sure, Sharon would say that I'm much too hard on myself. But if I'm not my harshest critic, who knows me deeper...that would be the One I'll be standing before.

Abraham answers God's call eagerly with the words "Hineni" - "I am here."

Tent Services

This new location for the tent will hold about 150 congregants, nearly half as many as could be accommodated on the Park Avenue side. Seating will be first come, first served as always, but everyone should note that it may be harder to secure a seat. If the tent reaches capacity, congregants will be directed to join the service in the sanctuary. Additionally, congregants will be directed to enter the tent through the front entrance of the building rather than walking along Park Avenue.

Tickets

There are not nearly enough opportunities to acknowledge to them that I've fallen short in my personal and professional life; that I've not lived up to expectations that I've set for myself, and that others have expected of me. The Gates are open, but only for a short time now. You should know I've tried, and

that I'm trying now; and with everything happening in the world around us. I'll keep trying; I have faith and hope. Rabbi Schultz's writings help, and I hope that you've checked out Barefoot Rabbi.

I'm thankful for many things, and I hope you understand that I make it through the High Holy Days and Festivals with the help and contributions from so many people. I'll have the opportunity to tell them leading up to this season.

The only good thing about the High Holy Days coming later, is that the Kehilah teachers and students are back, and I'll have the opportunity to see them all.

Will I make the time and create an opportunity to tell you? This is the task that I'm adding in my Outlook calendar.

A LOOK BACK, A LOOK FORWARD BY BETH LAZAR, CO-CHAIR, MENTAL HEALTH AWARENESS TEAM

September is the last month of summer and of the Jewish year 5784. As this year ends and the Jewish New Year 5785 approaches, the Mental Health Awareness Team takes a look back and a look forward. Our Team's mission is to fight stigma and to advocate for more services and resources for people dealing with mental illness. Though we support legislative bills and actions such as the federal funding of the 988 Emergency Mental Health Phoneline, our main focus is fighting stigma. Fighting stigma requires love and understanding, and that cannot be legislated. A spiritual community is needed to cultivate such attributes. That is why the Mental Health Awareness Team focus is within Congregation B'nai Israel, and not about membership in a national advocacy organization. We want to change hearts and minds to create an environment where all feel safe, secure, and comfortable discussing mental health issues without stigma or fear of repercussion. We do this through education, such as bulletin articles, speakers, and films. We also provide opportunities for people to learn about and discuss mental health together at events, such as field trips and an annual Mental Health Awareness Shabbat with a service, dinner, and speaker. Save the date: next year's Mental Health Awareness Shabbat is Friday, May 9, 2025.

Other exciting events to look out for in the Jewish New Year include:

1. A mental health, banned book discussion. We'll read and discuss the short story "The Yellow Wallpaper" by Charlotte Perkins Gilman, a harrowing tale of a woman's descent into madness, led by Marj Freeman.

2. Film: Orchestrating Change, a documentary about a professional orchestra where the conductor and the majority of the musicians are people who have a mental illness. There is a hefty fee to download this film, but due to a generous donation by Mental Health Awareness Team member Purim King, a docent-led tour of Yale Art Gallery with we will be able to present it. We will continue to hold monthly Zoom meetings to "check in" and have a speaker on mental health. The Zoom link can be found in the weekly Hashavua. 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




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KESHER CORNER
