BULLETIN GOES DIGITAL A NEW ERA FOR THE BULLETIN

The B'nai Israel Bulletin is going digital!

You are holding a collector's item: The last print copy of the temple's monthly bulletin. No, this publication is not going away, but congregation leaders made the decision to modernize delivery for significant cost savings and improved communication.

The bulletin will continue to come out monthly, and it will be sent to congregants via email and readily available on the temple website (www.cbibpt.org).

The move will save the congregation thousands of dollars each year in printing and mailing expenditures. More importantly, it provides greater flexibility and dexterity in delivering crucial information. It will be more timely, less redundant across our various channels, and more robust.

"This actually brings us more in line with where most congregations have gone," temple First Vice President Scott Smith said. "I surveyed other temples in our area and beyond. The collective response was, 'Wow, you still send a print version to every congregant?' They said the reaction to going digital was overwhelmingly positive."

For our June Mitzvah Morning Project, we will be working with Camp HOPE, a program managed by The Center for Family Justice (www.centerforfamilyjustice.org)

Camp HOPE is a summer camp specifically for children from Fairfield County who are victims of domestic abuse. The camp provides a clinically proven program designed to help these children overcome trauma in order to lead more hopeful and resilient lives. For two weeks during August, Camp HOPE campers will live at Camp Hi-Rock in the Berkshires, enjoying activities in the outdoors while receiving critical counseling and therapeutic services.

On June 8, at 10:00 a.m., we will meet at B'nai Israel to help pack trunks for the campers. Many of the campers are lacking the essential items they need for their time away, so we are looking for B'nai Israel volunteers to help provide them. Some supplies needed include backpacks, batteries, flashlights, fleece blankets, water bottles, laundry bags, and pillowcases.

Volunteers can bring these items to Mitzvah Morning or are welcome to drop them off in the B'nai Israel lobby the week before the event. In addition, there is an Amazon Wishlist which will be published in our email communications. Any items purchased on the Amazon wishlist will be delivered directly to B'nai Israel. Gently used items are welcome as well.



Postwar Stories: How Books Made Judaism American By Rachel Gordan



If you're a fan of literature, I think you'll really enjoy this book. The basic premise is that in the 1950s, post-Holocaust, it was Jewish literature and writing that helped to shape Jewish identity

in America. Depictions of Jews in novels and books shaped both how non-Jews saw Jewish Americans and how Jewish Americans understood themselves. Quite a fascinating read!

Yochanan's Gamble: Judaism's Pragmatic Approach to Life By Rabbi Marc Katz



our rabbis often thought pragmatically when navigating difficult and complex moral situations. Marc's examples from the Talmud and the rabbinic tradition are quite relevant as we modern Jews attempt to wrestle with contemporary dilemmas and issues.

Ghosts of a Holy War: The 1929 Massacre in Palestine That Ignited the Arab-Israeli Conflict

This was an important and difficult read. The book describes in detail 1929 Hebron, where Jews and Arabs lived together quite peacefully until a Saturday morning when 70 Jewish residents

of the city were brutally slaughtered by their Arab neighbors. Schwartz looks at this painful moment in Jewish history that is often untold, and she examines the relationship between Israelis and Arabs post October 7, 2023. Schwartz teaches that we must change our perspectives on the conflict if we ever wish, or hope, to see peace in the land of Israel.

After receiving a Bachelor's degree in English and Religious Studies from University of California, Santa Barbara, she moved to Santa Rosa, California, where she served as the Youth Coordinator at Congregation Shomrei Torah. There, she helped to run all youth and religious school programming and had opportunities to lead Torah study, give sermons, and lead Friday Shabbat services.




SUMMER READING WITH THE RABBIS (PART 2): RABBI MARION'S JEWISH FICTION RECOMMENDATIONS

Below are some of my favorite novels with Jewish themes, written by Jewish authors. If you read any of these this summer, let me know what you think! What are you reading this summer?

Eternal Life by Dara Horn



Rachel is a woman with a problem: she can't die. Her recent troubles widowhood, a failing business, an unemployed middle-aged son are only the latest in a litany spanning dozens of countries, scores of

marriages, and hundreds of children. In the 2,000 years since she made a spiritual bargain to save the life of her first son back in Roman-occupied Jerusalem, she's tried everything to free herself, and only one other person in the world understands: a man she once loved passionately, who has been stalking her through the centuries, convinced they belong together forever. But as the twenty-first century begins and her children and grandchildren—consumed with immortality in their own ways, from the frontiers of digital currency to genetic engineering—develop new technologies that could change her fate and theirs, Rachel knows she must find a way out. Gripping, hilarious, and profoundly moving, Eternal Life celebrates the bonds between generations, the power of faith, the purpose of death, and the reasons for being alive. (Review from Amazon.com)

Joy Comes in the Morning by Jonathan Rosen

Deborah Green is a woman of passionate contradictions—a rabbi who craves goodness and surety while wrestling with her own desires and with the sorrow and pain she sees around her. Her life changes when she visits the hospital room of Henry Friedman, an older man who has




parents were murdered in the Holocaust when he was a child, and all his life he's struggled with difficult questions: Can happiness really come after such loss, or does the very wish

profane the dead? Can religious promises ever bring peace? Deborah's encounter with Henry and his family draws her into a world of tragedy, frailty, love, and, finally, hope. (Review from Amazon.com)

Signal Fires by Dani Shapiro

Signal Fires opens on a summer night in 1985. Three teenagers have been drinking. One of them gets behind the wheel of a car, and, in an instant, everything on Division Street changes. Each of their lives, and that of Ben Wilf, a young doctor who arrives on the scene, is shattered. For the Wilf family, the circumstances of that fatal accident will become the deepest kind of secret, one so dangerous it can never be spoken. On Division Street, time has moved on. When the Shenkmans arrive—a young couple expecting a baby boy—it is




as if the accident never happened. But when Waldo, the Shenkmans' brilliant, lonely son who marvels at the beauty of the world and has a native ability to find connections in everything, befriends Dr. Wilf, now retired

and struggling with his wife's decline, past events come hurtling back in ways no one could ever have foreseen. (Review from Amazon.com)

The Book of V by Anna Solomon

Lily is a mother and a daughter. And a second wife. And a writer, maybe? Or she was going to be, before she had children.

attempted suicide. His Now, in her rented Brooklyn apartment she's grappling with her own desires, while also trying to manage her roles as a mother and a wife in 2016. Vivian Barr seems to be the perfect political wife, dedicated to helping her charismatic and ambitious husband find success in Watergate-era Washington D.C. But one night he demands a humiliating favor, and her refusal to obey changes the course of her life—along with the lives of others. Esther is a fiercely independent



young woman ancient Persia, where she and her uncle's tribe live a tenuous existence outside the palace walls. When an innocent mistake results in devastating consequences for her

people, she is offered up as a sacrifice to please the King, in the hopes that she will save them all. In Anna Solomon's The Book of V., these three characters' riveting stories overlap and ultimately collide, illuminating how women's lives have and have not changed over thousands of *years.* (Review from Amazon.com)

UPDATE ON COMPOSTING AT B'NAI ISRAEL

The Ecojustice Team is proud to report that during the past year's composting pilot, B'nai Israel diverted approximately 1,500 pounds of food waste, the equivalent of 1,500 miles not driven by cars in terms of greenhouse gas reduction. The 5-gallon compost buckets are being filled during pizza Wednesdays at Bonim and Shabbat onegs, as well as some larger events. In the upcoming year, we are excited to further reduce our waste by piloting the use of compostable cups, plates, and utensils at events where it is not possible to use real service ware.

Composting is very beneficial for the environment as it addresses both the waste crisis and the climate crisis simultaneously. CT is currently in a waste crisis, and we are running out of places to put our trash. Locally, trash is incinerated at the Wheelbrator plant in Bridgeport, which emits pollutants into the air we breathe. In other locations, food waste goes into landfills and, when it degrades, generates methane, a very potent greenhouse gas. Food waste is estimated to contribute to 8% of greenhouse emissions globally. In households, it's estimated that about 30% of waste is food that could be diverted through composting and made into nutrient-rich soil, which could then be used to grow more food.


We are excited to announce that we are partnering with our current curbside composting vendor, Action Waste, a local Fairfield company, to help support composting at B'nai Israel. For every B'nai Israel member household that signs

up to try residential curbside composting, Action Waste will provide a credit to the temple's account in addition to giving you your first month of service free. You may access the promotion with the QR code below.

SHULCLOUD

DON'T FORGET TO UPDATE YOUR SHULCLOUD PAYMENT PLANS

It is time to update your annual payment plans in ShulCloud.

The online portal enables B'nai Israel congregants to more easily view balances, pay for annual contributions and other account charges, set up automatic recurring payments, make donations, and view family yahrzeits.

Your ShulCloud username and password remain the same, but you must update your automatic payments schedule.

ShulCloud lets you tailor your payment schedule, be it a one-time full payment, monthly payments, every other month, and so on. Remember that you must pay at least 25 percent of your annual contribution up front to be eligible for High Holy Days services tickets.

ShulCloud also lets you combine your annual contribution with other services, such as the security fee, Kehilah, and Bonim. While most payments can be spread monthly into June, Bonim payments must be completed by May.

ShulCloud makes the process easier for you and B'nai Israel:

 You can choose to pay via ACH (Automated Clearing House) directly from your bank account. (B'nai Israel incurs a processing fee for every credit card payment.)

- If you pay by credit card, you can opt to cover the processing fee when you set up your payment schedule.
- The instructions for setting up each form of payment can be found on ShulCloud, which you can access via the Member Login tab atop the homepage at www.cbibpt.org.
